Economics for the Well-being of All

Economics is the science of fulfillment of the need for physical facilities of a human being, ensuring the Universal Human Order. It is for the well-being of all. To ensure this generation after generation, it is necessary to have clarity about the following-· Difference between Needs of Self and Body, and their Program for Fulfillment The needs of the self are continuous and qualitative, while those of the body are limited in time and quantity. The needs of the

self are fulfilled through the right understanding and right feeling, while those of the body are fulfilled by physical facilities. Such clarity helps in the identification of wants and in defining the program for its fulfillment.

· Happiness is our Innate Nature and not due to External Influence

Happiness is our innate nature. Happiness is to be in a state of harmony within and it is the same for all. Today, excitement is considered as happiness, thus it is assumed that happiness is different for different people, leading to the conclusion that there is a basic dichotomy in society.

· Feeling of Prosperity

Prosperity is the feeling of having/producing more than the required physical facility for nurturing, protection, and the right utilization of the Body. Prosperity is not the possession or accumulation of wealth. Clarity on the difference between needs and wants helps to identify the needs of the body and its fulfillment by sustainable production. The outcome of the feeling of prosperity is participation in the enrichment of the rest of the nature.

Human Goal and its Fulfillment through various Dimensions of Society

The human goal is the Right Understanding and Right Feelings (in every individual), Prosperity (in every family), Fearlessness (Trust in society), and Coexistence (Mutual fulfillment with rest of the nature). The Human Goal can be fulfilled by different Dimensions of Society including Education-Sanskar, Sanyam-Health, etc.

• Acceptance of Labor with a Feeling of Self-regulation Self-regulation is the feeling of ensuring the health of the body. For this, labor and exercise are the essential components of the program for self-regulation. Acceptance of labor is also required to produce necessary physical facilities.

· Exchange for Mutual Fulfillment (not with the obsession of profit)

There are three possible types of Economics:

Take and take economics: It leads to exploitation, deprivation, and wars and hence certainly is not acceptable naturally.

Take and give economics: It is not sustainable and mutually fulfilling.

Give and give economics: It is sustainable and mutually fulfilling, and hence has to be promoted through education. This is the meaning of exchange for Mutual fulfillment.

Storage for Right Utilization (not for hoarding/accumulation)

Storage is required for the right utilization of physical facilities. The storage is for the fulfillment of the relationship and not for hoarding/accumulation.

The natural acceptance of a human being is for harmony in nature. A Human being wants to be fulfilling for the rest of nature. The role of a human being is to understand the harmony in nature to participate in the enrichment, protection, and preservation of the rest of nature.

Conclusion

While much work on economics has been focused on 'What I am', a comprehensive theory of economics is required in which we focus on 'What I want to be' and also distinguish between 'What I am' and 'What I want to be'. Then only economics can be humane and in the interest of the well-being of all, i.e., the prosperity of a human being and the preservation of the rest of nature, in a sustainable, mutually enriching manner.
